hat can economic development councils and state government do to help Otsego County's communities achieve vibrant futures?

To find the answer, more than 80 people – municipal officials, school superintendents and business leaders – gathered at the Foothills Performing Arts Center Tuesday, May 5.

The first session featured Dede Scozzafava, New York deputy secretary of state for local government.

He elaborated. "There is a mental block to small rural counties not on the I-90 corridor. We don't meet a lot of the criteria for grants even though we need them. There is a population outside the urban areas of the state."

County Treasurer Dan Crowell had a more positive take on the DOS presentation: "Good things are emerging – creative solutions balanced by insights into the challenges of implementation," he said.

County Board Chair Kathy Clark, R-Otego, floated ideas of her own, seeing possible benefits of merger in the Office of the Aging: "Why do we need a dietitian for every county?" The hard

part is changing mindsets, she said.
